MINISTER'S LETTER



The radio is on in the background as I write, reporting that the Iraqi army and Kurdish Peshmerga fighters are converging on Iraq's second city, Mosul. It is estimated that 6000 ISIL fighters are trying to hide amongst the 1 million civilians including hundreds of thousands of children.

As I listen to the reporting, I'm reminded of my pastoral visit yesterday where we talked about the conflict and I followed on with some wordy prayers. When I finished praying, I looked up to see tears in the eyes of the person I was praying with and they quietly with feeling said, *"Poor devils – the children subject to the bombing – poor devils."* I could make noise with my lengthy prayers but here was someone who having lived through the London blitz as a child, could immediately walk in the insecure and uncertain shoes of a child in Mosul. He bought them before God in prayer with one heart felt, compassionate sentence. We went on to talked about the Blitz; the fear of not getting to the shelter in time; and hiding under the kitchen table, waiting for the sinister intermittent buzzing noise of the doodle bugs to cut out. Will it be us? Will it be our house today? No, not this time, as the explosion is heard further down the street. My friend recalled the experience with such immediacy and tension, the event could have been lived yesterday and eventually our discussions led us on to look at peace and in particular a Christian understanding of peace.

Was it the absence of noise, warfare, and terrorism? Or was it peace in terms of silence, or peace in terms of the absence of inner turmoil?

Into this world of violence and inner turmoil, Jesus came to bring peace, bringing a radical understanding built upon the Old Testament idea of "Shalom". This is not so much about the absence of certain factors, being empty or devoid of trouble, but rather about the presence of goodwill, the presence of love, and the encouragement of relationships which build upon forgiveness, reconciliation and unity. For Jesus peace is about the presence of well-being and of wholeness.

In Christian terms, peace is not simply absence, but presence; not simply passive, but active. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus proclaimed the peacemakers as "blessed", in so far as they were not just to be about preventing warfare or stopping fighting, but rather that they have an active role in promoting reconciliation and developing the kind of communities of relationship which build for peace, engender harmony, and establish trust. It is a call to us, through discipleship, to take up that role, wherever we are and whatever situations we find ourselves in.

The peace that Christ offers also concerns inner transformation and renewal. This is not simply a call to engage with those around us, whilst wallpapering over the painful cracks in our own lives. Rather, it involves a process of becoming at peace with ourselves, a journey which calls us to be vulnerable and reconcile our own

struggles, flaws and failings. Through this renewal, we not only deepen our own walk with God, but walk in humility with others in seeking make and build peace.

So as we approach Remembrance Sunday once more, let us not only seek peace for those areas currently striven with conflict, but look the peace we might build around us, forged out of an understanding of what it is to be at peace with ourselves and God.

GREENBELT 2016

This is my 7th Year of attending Greenbelt and it is never the same. This year the firsts were camping in Tangerine Fields, actually having Cider in the Jesus Arms and being so inspired as to volunteer Wesley for a worship session next year!

The familiar items were the swimming pool at the hotel, putting on waterproofs and getting sunburnt all in a day, listening to amazing speakers (John Bell, Terry Waite, ABC – sorry nickname /abbreviation for the Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby, Nadia Boltz -Weber and Mark Russell. These are just some of the speakers I got to this year) and attending a variety of worship sessions lead by the Quakers, The Iona Community, The Corrymeela Community and the main Sunday morning Communion and eating at the café in the Christian Aid tent. Lastly but most importantly having conversations about issues from the Bible or of Life with other people and you realise you have common interests and beliefs and Christianity is NOT dying!

All the talks at Greenbelt 2016 I have so if you are interested apparently I can send them to you from my laptop. Might need some help with this but was assured it was simple. However, one talk that was not recorded was given by Terry Waite. In such a humbling manner he recounted his capture, the political reasons behind it in Beirut, the torture and threat of death and how he got through with faith and his love of any books he was given. The first book he mentioned gave a sense of humourous relief into the silence his retelling commanded from his audience, 'Great Escapes' by Eric Williams, a book of stories detailing escapes from prison camps in World War 11. Terry Waite's book Taken on Trust is being reprinted and republished and I would suggest well worth a read. I do not have that but I do have Footfalls in Memory also about his captivity in Beirut and I often reread it. A standing ovation from a packed Glade Big Top followed his final words. Wonderfully emotionally moving.

The Sunday morning Communion was amazing as it was led by children with the help of Fishy Music, again having communion with strangers and friends within a mass of 12,000 people is for me unique and something I have only experienced at Greenbelt.

Now to the camping. I can fully recommend Tangerine Fields for a variety of reasons. I think they were very cheap as they pre erect your ordered tent and are fully responsible for it for the whole weekend, so if it does not stay dry or the airbed goes down they will come and sort it for you even in the middle of the night. This year they were placed near the entrance to the Festival Village and our tent was all of 15 yards away from a café. Although not very close to the loos – well who would want to be- it was close enough to see the queue before going to use. When I went to wash and brush my teeth with my battery operated toothbrush I did notice everyone else seemed to have ordinary toothbrushes.

Finally, for the challenge of a worship session. At Wesley I do feel we offer inclusive often creative worship such as the stick dances and drama so I have volunteered a group (of whoever wants to join us) to lead one or two sessions at Greenbelt in 2017. The Sunday morning Communion is always special but for the last couple of years I think worship has become more meditative and there has been less use of drama and movement, something I think we could offer ideas for at Greenbelt even given the limited space and time requirements of being at a festival. Hope you think the same. Once Greenbelt have got back to me I will gather a group, book tickets, book hotel and campsite and we can start planning for the theme of The Common Good. All those not actually in the group I would hope you would come and support us, it is only 2 hours travelling providing there are no hold ups.

I rarely get to the Playhouse or Little Big Top where such acts as Dr Professor Pumpernickel and Nutty Noah perform. I rarely get to much music but hearing Folk On, Martyn Joseph and Hot 8 Brass Band you should be able to judge the range of music acts so really hoping you will want to experience Greenbelt 2017.

If you are a resident in the area of Leigh and frequent the Broadway you may have noticed the large scale painting going on around the building works at Wesley Methodist Church. My name is Mary Lister and I am a local artist organising this painting. I was first approached by the churches Reverend Julia Monaghan and asked to do some kind of painting to mask the boring boards that would be up whilst the church had various changes made. I heard that they would be losing one of the stained glass windows which was situated at the entrance. With this in mind I came up with the theme of stained glass windows and beautiful archways, but I also wanted to represent our diverse community in some way. Looking at the great expanse of wall I had undertaken I thought it would be a great opportunity to paint a panorama type image of the estuary from Southend to Leigh-on-sea with its gorgeous coast and quirky features; this being the art deco architecture of the Cliffs Pavilion, Southend Pier, our statue of Queen Victoria and Leigh's old Town. I wanted to capture all the things that make this part of Essex such a wholesome and well-rounded place to live with a plethora of beautiful views and activities to take part in (with a few Pokémon thrown in for good measure). To take it a step further I have organized the painting so that it is a large scale paint by numbers in which anyone can join in, young and old, to make their mark on where they come from. So far the painting has been eagerly received and has opened up so many people to talk to each other about where they live, what they like about Leigh and Southend and how they have enjoyed the artwork in some way. North Street Junior School has had amazing involvement and, I've heard, have skipped a P.E. lesson or two to take part, and many passers-by have had a dabble who perhaps never had an art interest or feel they were capable have done an amazing job.

I just want to say a huge thank you to all those that have helped me to paint this, it has been an extraordinary team effort. A special thanks to my mum and dad for all of their help painting and carting paints back and forth to the church for me and a big thank you to Wesley Church for giving me the opportunity to make an artwork that has inspired so many to take part.
