MINISTER'S LETTER



JOSEPH

Man of Faith

I have just come down from the manse loft after retrieving the Nativity Set and two thoughts occur to me. The first is, what a tip it is up there and how Sam and I need to get our act together and do some sorting out. The second is, that Josepth needs a polish, clean and his paint touched up — he's looking a bit care worn!

Two of the Gospel writers, Matthew and Luke, relay the story of Jesus' birth. Matthew, a Jew, writing for Jewish converts points to Jesus as Messiah and King, the fulfillment of God's promises through the old testament, from Abraham to David. While Luke, the doctor and gentile, emphasises that the good news is for all people everywhere, for every race and nation. In pulling his story together, Matthew writes from Joseph's stand point, while Luke concentrates on the experience of Mary.

As this Christmas, the bible readings set by the wider church are from Matthew's gospel, I thought it would be good to take a few moments to ponder 'care worn' Joseph and consider what a man of faith he was.

So here is Joseph, chosen by God to be head of this Holy Family. He belongs to the 'House of David' and, in Jewish law, any adoptive son legally belongs to his adoptive father's line of descent. He is an ordinary man, working with his hands as a carpenter. He is described in scripture as a 'man of honour,' (Matthew 1:), a quality borne out by his compassionate response to Mary on hearing the news of her pregnancy. He chooses to quietly dismiss her, rather than have her face being stoned, as was the law, outlined in Deuteronomy 22. Having got his head around the pregnancy, he is told in a dream that Mary has conceived by the Holy Spirit;

that she will give birth to a son; and 'you,' will call him Jesus, meaning God saves. No wonder our Joseph is looking a bit care worn.

Let's take a moment to think about the impact of this on Joseph. In light of the full gospel message, we are able to relate to God through Jesus, our friend, shepherd, suffering servant and King. Joseph, however, had no such experience. For him, God was Yahweh, Adonai, El –Shaddai, the Lord; so holy he couldn't be named. Hence when Moses encountered him, as a vision of holiness in Exodus, his instinct was to fall on his knees and cover his face. His intial reaction was, 'not me, I'm not worthy, no one will believe me.'

It seems to me that Joseph by contrast, accepts. He doesn't understand, but he believes in God's power. It's as simple as that. He believes that almighty God has chosen him to be the husband of Mary; and father to her son. Both his and Moses' responses to God can be food for thought for us today.

We can pray for a deeper understanding of the holiness of God, so that we can spiritually fall on our knees, like Moses in wonder at who God is. But at the same time, if we believe like Joseph and surrender to God, there is no limit to what God can achieve in our own very ordinary lives.

Prayer

God of all hope and all joy,
Open our hearts in welcome,
That Your Son Jesus Christ at his coming
May find in us a dwelling prepared for himself;
Who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
One God now and forever.
(New Zealand Prayer Book)

Wishing you all the joy and wonder of the Christ child.

The message for our homebased congregations in Leigh

Christmas Greetings to our homebased congregations spanning across the 3 Leigh churches. If you are unable to leave your home this Christmas to join the festivities in our church buildings, this message is directly for you. How are you? Have you put your Christmas tree up yet and are you looking forward to the coming of Jesus with a hopeful heart? Well to spur you on your way, here are a few verses of Psalm 96, the inspirtional 'song of praise,' set for Christmas Eve, along with a few of my thoughts on these verses. So make a coffee, find a mince pie and know this is directly for you.

Psalm 96: 10-13

10. Say among the nations, "The Lord is king!

The world is firmly established; it shall never be moved.

He will judge the peoples with equity."

11. Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice;

let the sea roar, and all that fills it;

12. *let the field exult, and everything in it.*

Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy

13. before the Lord; for he is coming,

for he is coming to judge the earth.

He will judge the world with righteousness,

and the peoples with his truth.

This beautiful enthronement psalm sings a new song to the God above all gods, calling all who hear it, to declare God's glory and proclaim God's salvation. The psalmist who sings this song, calls upon Israel's history and remembers the Song

of Miriam, as she danced with tambourines celebrating the deliverance from death to new life, after crossing the Red Sea.

The psalmist goes on to evoke creation, reminding us that as we sing this song, we do so in a chorus that includes the heavens and the earth, the sea and all that fills it, the trees of the forest, as well as all the families of the earth. The overwhelming good news in verse 10, is that the stability of the world is a done deal - "it shall never be moved," says the psalmist. The Lord of this psalm is the Lord of all, so there can be no more warring among the nations about whose truth or rightness shall reign on earth.

I also note that the verbs in this psalm are often in the future tense. The world *will* never be moved; he *is coming* to Judge the people with equity. When this happens all the trees of the field "*will sing* for joy". It's like the good news of salvation is anticipated into the future, as if that might be the only place where it might be believable!

When you listen to your wireless; watch the TV and read your newspaper, you may feel that the world is in pretty rough shape and that perhaps proclaming hope in the future is always a safer bet than encouraging trust in the present. But we can have little faith in the future if we can't find the seeds of hope in today. And in this season of hopefulness, I'm not going to let the newspapers have the last word that war and disaster and hate are the only stories out there to be heard. There are other stories to be told too, where the gospel of hope and kindness and courage and stability break into the everyday. Where people are looking out for one another, even at risk of their own life; where courage and bravery are found in unexpected places and where unexpected determination and strength are found where it seemed impossible.

If we listen hard, we find other stories that should be honoured and heard. So tonight on the evening news, I listened to the tremendous courage of MP Jo Cox, who, when assaulted by her assailant so brutally outside her office, was heard to call to work colleagues to get back inside, that they might be protected from harm. Or, 4 year old Suzie McCash from Tynemouth, who had the courage and good sense to call 999, when her Mum Rowena collapsed following a respiratory arrest. Or for sheer audacity, 87 year old, cancer surving *Granny Bin*, who flew down the fastest zip wire at 60mph over the Eden Project, to raise money for Shelter Box Charity, this Christmas. Granny Bin said after completing the run that she would like to fly to

the moon next! And well why not, for both this psalm and the news from Bethlehem, announce that in the birth of this holy baby, God does deliver, "good news of great joy for all the people," and that love, is indeed stronger than death.

You may recall in July/Aug edition of the Clarion I posed the question "Did you know Southend-On-Sea is working towards becoming a Dementia Friendly town and that this status has been awarded thanks to the partnership work of the Southend Dementia Action Alliance (SDAA) which was launched in March 2015. The SDAA is made up of local businesses, services and community groups all working in partnership with the council.

I am very pleased to share the news that our church along with a growing number of churches has joined the SDAA. In order to be accepted as part of this group Wesley has had to commit to an Action Plan that clearly outlines how we can improve our support for people living with dementia and their carers.

It is our vision that people with or without dementia can approach God, Worship and praise God and feel Gods caring presence together.

Worship can be a channel for recalling the past, creating feelings of comfort, familiarity and spiritual fulfilment. We all have a continuing need to worship and experience a loving encounter with God and the afternoon will take a regular pattern of welcome; singing well-known hymns, reading familiar passages of scripture and saying the Lord's Prayer together.

The formal part of the service will last 30 minutes, before leading into a craft activity and hospitality, which provide an opportunity for conversation to reinforce the theme of the service.

Prayer Diary December 2016

This prayer diary has been inspired by: "Safer than a known way" by Ruth Etchells; various publications from the Nationwide Christian Trust; "Look well to this day" by Tom Gordon; and The Leprosy Mission.

8th. Father God, thank you that you have a plan for our lives, and that you have given your Holy Spirit to help us to discover it. May we be guided by You in all things so we may have a life that is pleasing and honouring to You.

9th. Father we know that "you will never leave us or forsake us". We remember those who have difficult and painful anniversaries at this time. We ask you to be with them and give them your peace.

10th. Father God, sometimes we feel alone; fill that void with your loving presence, that we may know that we are deeply loved and profoundly valued by you.

11th. Father God, today is our first service in our newly refurbished church building. A special day. We praise and thank you for all that come to our Nativity Service today that they may learn of your love through your precious gift of Jesus.

12th. A thought: when the Japanese mend broken objects, they repair the damage by filling the cracks with gold. They believe that when something has suffered damage and has a history it becomes more beautiful. In the same way the worries and difficulties that we encounter and overcome make us the people that we are - mature, experienced and beautiful. Father thank you for the tapestry of our lives.

13th. Perfect endings? We tend to learn the hard way, that some stories don't have a clear beginning, middle and end, Life is about taking one step at a time, not knowing the outcome or even the journey. Do not be afraid of tomorrow for God is already there.

14th. May God bless you today. Everyday is a new start; a new opportunity to live life to the full and to find blessings in unexpected places. Jesus said: "I came that you may have life, and have it abundantly". We pray today for our local North Street School as they celebrate their Carol Concert in our Church.

15th. We pray today for the Pre-school that meets each weekday at Wesley. We pray for the children, parents, leaders and staff as they hold their Christmas Concert in our church.

16th. We pray your blessing on our Carol Singing tonight. Father God, we offer our hearts in preparation of the wonder of your coming to us this Christmas in simplicity as a child amidst your own creation.

17th. We thank you Lord for all the true delights of Christmas: the joy of planning gifts with care and love for those who will receive them.

18th. We thank you for the joy of festive gatherings where we seek each other's pleasure: the joy of small children's wondering excitement; the profound and beautiful joy as we worship tonight at Wesley with our Carol Concert.

19th. Father, help us to understand the true mystery of your coming at Christmas time - let us see in this vulnerable, homeless infant, the one He will become: in his manhood showing the inexhaustible love of our Father for us.

20th. Father, we bring to you this Christmas all who are without a home: those who have lost their homes through natural disasters.

21st. We pray for:

- those who were driven from their homes by war and terror.

22nd. We pray for:

- those who have lost their homes through poverty
- those who were driven from their homes by unkindness.

23rd. We pray for:

- those who seek continually for a home but cannot find one. Lord send them your help through their fellow human beings' concern and practical aid, - may we play our own part in such care.

24th. Dear Lord, be the one supreme gift tonight to your waiting world. May all our small tokens to each other speak of the overwhelming love of your Christmas gift to us.

25th. "In the bleak mid-winter, a stable place sufficed The Lord God almighty, Jesus Christ"... "What can I give Him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; if I were a wise man I would do my part, yet what I can I give him - give my heart." Hymn 204, "Singing the Faith"

26th. Boxing Day - Is traditionally the day when servants and tradesmen would receive a gift known as a 'Christmas box'. Today we know it as a Bank or Public holiday. In 1994 in South Africa December 26th was renamed the day of "goodwill" and after the first fully democratic elections marked a visible end to the era of apartheid.

27th. So, the "day of goodwill" was a symbol that the spirit of Christmas needed to be carried over to the next day and the day after and for every succeeding day for the goodwill of its people. We pray for the people of South Africa.

28th. During the days following Christmas we thank you, Father, for our families and friends; the time spent together, in phone calls abroad, and the opportunity to be together.

29th. And yet, Father, we remember those who are not so fortunate at Christmas time; for those who face sadness and feel so alone. We pray for those who are so desperate that they need to access the help of "Samaritans" phone lines. We pray for them and those who seek to help them.

30th. We pray for the young people at our church who attend the Fusion events led by Jonathan. We pray for the leaders, helpers and children. We pray for those attending pantomimes and those from the churches visiting and participating today in the ballet "Red Shoes" by Matthew Bourne.

31st. We pray for all those using the Night Shelter, the staff and volunteers, that each may experience your love, Father God. As we ponder on the year that has passed with all the events that have impacted our lives, we pray for the year that is to come with the words of Jesus: "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age". Thank You



I would like to thank everybody from Belfairs, Highlands and Wesley Churches who supported and sponsored me on the *Big Barnardo's Bike Ride*. It was a real adventure and challenge, which I enjoyed much more than I'd ever anticipated. Thanks for the messages that a number of you sent me en route - but even more so for the money that you raised across the 3 churches to support Barnardo's work across Essex.

Belfairs, Highlands and Wesley raised £1,700

We were exceedingly fortunate with the weather, with sunshine most days. The 6 of us, who were the core team, also got on really well. I hadn't realised that team work would be so important, especially keeping you going when you got a bit tired. Amongst those who joined us for the odd day was Olympian Daley Thompson, which gave us a real boost mid-way.

The 362 miles were broken down into: Holyhead to Chester; then to Telford;; then Worcester; then Oxford; and finally to Barkingside. North Wales proved easier than I thought due to the longest sea-wall - so fewer hills. Crossing rural Shropshire down through Worcestershire to the Cotswolds on crisp sunny days was stunning - if latterly so much more hilly than I'd thought. Finally, crossing North London for 18 miles, I lost count of how many speed bumps I went over, but felt every one of them.

So thank you from me and Barnardo's and the children and families we support. Overall I raised £3,000 and as a team we think we've raised £17,000 - 10% from the Leigh Section alone!

People and especially students ask if they know about certain churches they may want to attend. People come in asking about Jesus as a response to a window display. Christian friends meet there and on one occasion (probably more but Michael just gave us one example) a whole debate ensued with all the customers and staff able to converse about Christianity.

I know from my experience it is a place to browse, even read a whole chapter and usually come away feeling I have stepped closer to God.

The shop has won awards for its community works and has supplied libraries, prisons and orphanages with Christian books so it is having an impact locally and nationally.

BUT

We will lose this resource and outreach if we do not support it. As a business, they cannot run at a loss. What other business begins each morning with prayer for God's kingdom, where else can you browse for so long, where else can you have the joy of seeing and feeling the items you buy, where else is there a calmness, peace and a smile, where else is conversation helpful – dare I say not on Amazon.

So if you want Christian cards, notes, books and music try the Southend Christian bookshop first and at 15% discount I think we will all be pleased and the shop will remain a Christian outreach for us all. See you there especially before Christmas.

TIME FOR HEALING - Healing, Trust and Abandonment

I am writing this piece shortly after seeing the film "A street cat named Bob". The film, taken from the book of the same name by James Bowen, tells how James — a homeless man who was addicted to drugs — turns his life around, with the support of a social worker, when he begins to care, at times in a self-denying way, for a stray cat named Bob. It is a realistic and yet life affirming film about the effects of abandonment and it set me thinking about how the healing process can be linked to resolution of abandonment wounds.

It's sometimes too easy for those with faith to say "Trust in God – he is your father in heaven" as though this will solve a person's problems. How does this speak to someone whose experience of a father, or parents in general, is one of a lack of care or even abuse? Perhaps we need to look at it another way.

The former Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams has this to say:

The cry to God as 'Father' in the New Testament is not a calm acknowledgement of a universal truth about God's abstract fatherhood.

It is the Child's cry out of a nightmare.

It is the cry of outrage, fear, shrinking away, when faced with the horror of the 'world' – yet not simply or exclusively protest, but trust as well.

'Abba Father' all things are possible to Thee ...

(A meditation taken from Celtic Daily Prayer-From the Northumbria Community)

We should still ask God for healing and deliverance from our feelings of abandonment, but we need to see that we must play our part as well. This may entail seeking appropriate help from others; counselling or other professional services or perhaps some medical intervention for a physical problem. God can work through these agents to give us help guidance and healing. Sometimes, we may find that looking beyond ourselves to the wellbeing of others, or animals, or taking up a new activity will provide a key that unlocks a path to self-restoration and fulfilment without repressing or denying our pain.

Jesus often spoke about the way a good shepherd looks after his flock – even to the extent of endangering himself to assure their safety.

John 10:11

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep"

(Taken from The Holy Bible – New International Version)

Ultimately he sacrificed himself for us on the cross, so we can be confident of God's unconditional love for each of us.

Somebody once said to me that God is not "the God of the sweetshop" of whom we ask for everything sweet and nice and are given it. God is always looking at our lives in the round, doing things in his way and his time for our greater good in the long run. This is difficult for us to grasp as impatient humans for we want our solutions now! What we have to learn is that our experiences, whilst they greatly influence who we are and how we behave, need not be constraints that prevent us from changing. God will help us use our experiences to better understand who we are and how we can be part of the changes we wish to see. If we can make our prayer a two way relationship with God through Jesus we can ask and then listen for guidance in reply. Often we will find that solutions become apparent as God works to guide us towards the right outcomes. We can rely on him;

Hebrews 13:5

..because God has said, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you." (Taken from The Holy Bible – New International Version)
