#### **MINISTER'S LETTER**



### AUTUMN LEAVES

I think one of my favourite times of year is the autumn, when the leaves turn and start to fall. Autumn's an oxymoron really, as it's the 'end' of a 'never-ending' circle of life, as we await the spring and the new life it brings.

For us too, life can sometimes seem to go in stages or seasons. We can go through times of joy and times of sadness, times of great excitement and times of apathy, times when life seems to be rolling down hill and we don't have any cares, to uphill sections when life is tough and we sometime struggle to see the summit.

And all this change in life can, and does, give us a sense of unease and instability.

The Prophet Jeremiah, lived one of the most dramatic lives in the Bible. But he never learned to like his role. Through all the excitement he remained reluctant, insure, and often unhappy. His life sounds very much like ours at times; excitement, reluctance, insecurity, unhappiness etc.

But throughout Jeremiah's life *and* ours, there *is* something that we can rely on that is *always* the same and *always* there, that is our Father God. So, no matter our circumstances, no matter our problems *or* joys, we have a consistency in Him; we have something to bed ourselves on.

Jeremiah 17: 7-8 says; <sup>7</sup> 'Blessed is the one who trusts in the LORD, whose confidence is in him. <sup>8</sup> They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its roots by the stream. It does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green. It has no worries in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit.'[NIV-UK] In this reading we're not promised to be protected when the 'heat' comes, but we are promised that we have nothing to fear when it does, and that we can still 'bear fruit' even when times are difficult. This was Jeremiah's experience. So, whatever you're feeling or experiencing today, remember to sink your roots into the Rock of Ages and you too, will always bear fruit, in season, and out. The next Time for Healing Prayer Group will be held on November 25<sup>th</sup> between 11.30am - 12.30pm. Meetings are typically attended by six to ten people with the majority often being from outside our usual church membership. The format usually includes prayers of thanksgiving and intercession, together with a short meditation on the theme of healing and occasional testimony. This is followed by the opportunity for private prayer with one or more of the group leaders. It is open to anyone, so please come and join us if you can, and give, receive, or just take much needed time out. Future meetings are planned for the following dates:

The meditation used at the October meeting was as follows:

#### Oh God why haven't you healed me? Luke 4:40

## "At sunset, the people brought to Jesus all who had various kinds of illness, and laying his hands on each one, he healed them"

(Taken from The Holy Bible – New International Version)

This week has included the feast day of St Luke (October 18<sup>th</sup>) and this was celebrated on the BBC Radio 4 Sunday Worship programme on 15<sup>th</sup> October which focussed on the work of hospices all around the world. Whilst the word hospice is an ancient term, the hospice movement we see today, offering a place of respite and palliative care, is essentially quite modern and the first purpose built hospice opened as recently as 50 years ago, in 1967, in South London.

The gospel writer Luke was himself a physician and his gospel contains many instances of Jesus healing the sick. Luke seems to emphasise that Jesus spent his time with the afflicted and the suffering rather than the powerful and the elite of his day. He was "deeply moved" by the suffering of those he saw and became involved in their lives and healing at the physical, psychological and spiritual level.

Don't we often wonder why God in his infinite mercy has not healed us or the person we are praying for? It is something which is very hard to understand and we can only continue with our prayers and help for those who are suffering illnesses or afflictions of whatever type. We trust and hope that healing will come.

Professor John Wyatt, Emeritus Professor of Neonatal Paediatrics, University College London and a member of the ethics advisory committee of the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health, said the following as part of in an address he gave during the Radio 4 broadcast on 15<sup>th</sup> October.

"I have no easy answers for the painful realities which many of us face in our lives. There is something deeply mysterious, strange and inexplicable about the suffering which we meet, both in our own lives and in those we are called to help. An anonymous quotation from the hospice movement has been a source of strength and wisdom for me.

"Suffering is not a question which demands an answer, it's not a problem which demands a solution... It's a mystery which demands a presence".

So those of us who are carers are not called to give answers and explanations, we are called to 'be there', to be a presence with those who are facing suffering, loss and pain." Later in the address he went on to say:

"In fact it seems to me that this is the deepest mystery of the Christian faith. Suffering and evil and pain can be transformed, can be redeemed by God's grace and turned into something unexpected and wonderful. It seems that God's plan for this age is not to abolish human suffering, but to redeem it – to bring blessing and healing out of evil and pain. This is a deep mystery, but I have experienced it in my own life, and I have seen it in the lives of many others."

Professor Wyatt later ended his address by referring to the Book of Revelation: "Before I finish I can't talk about the mystery of suffering without looking to the future. In Christian thought suffering is always shot through with hope and longing for the future."

#### Revelation 21:3b-4

*"Look! God's dwelling-place is now among the people and he will dwell with them. They will be his people and God himself will be with them and be their God. "He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death" or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away."* 

(Taken from The Holy Bible – New International Version)

He concluded with the following:

"I've always been struck by this image. This is not a picture of a terrible and fearful holy God. No. This is a mother's lap and a child whose face is streaked and blotchy from hours of crying, and gentle fingers are stroking away the tears. This is our God, the motherly father, the one who inspires every gentle and compassionate carer, the one who promises that one day there will be no more mourning, no more crying, and no more pain."

#### **BUSY HANDS – part 2**

I would like to extend a really big thank you to everyone who has already responded to last month's BUSY HANDS feature.

- Thank you for the wool you have donated.
- Thank you for the Twiddle Muffs you have knitted.

And just in case you would like to knit a Twiddle Muff I have included the pattern again.

#### HOW TO MAKE A TWIDDLE MUFF



**Materials needed for TWIDDLE MUFF :** A selection of leftover and odd balls of wool. Needles: 8mm circular or 6.5mm straight needles

**Cuff:** Cast on 45 stitches using 2 strands of double knitting wool or 1 strand of chunky wool (one plain colour works best). Work in stocking stitch (knit a row, purl a row) for 11 inches.

**Muff Body:** Continue with stocking stitch, but use up oddments of various textures of wool such as chunky, mohair, ribbon etc. until the work measures 23 inches (two strands of double knit for two rows each gives a lovely assortment of colours) Cast off.

**Finishing:** If working with straight needles, lightly iron the long strip, then neatly join the sides together using edge to edge stitch (with the knit side facing out). Turn inside out and push the one colour cuff up inside the muff body. Sew the two ends together, again using a neat edge to edge stitch.

**Decoration:** Now you can decorate the muff, inside and out, with ribbons, beads, flowers, zips, loops, pompoms, buttons, etc. You could even knit a separate pocket for a favourite photo. Be creative, but make sure each item is securely attached!
